Frequently Asked Questions revised 4/24

Where are the guidelines for awards found?

The award requirements can be found the council website <u>www.gsnnj.org</u>. All the required forms are also on the website.

Can girls begin their award Take Action Project while working on their Journey?

<u>No</u>, they must complete their Journey(s) before moving on to the award Take Action Project. Working through the Journey provides the girls with a skill and knowledge base that will help them to be more successful with their award Take Action Projects. Journeys offer the girls challenges to *Discover* community issues, *Connect* with their communities and *Take Action* to create lasting change. Each Journey deals with a community issue and is full of the information a girl would need to better inderstand that issue. Girls will follow the same path through the award Take Action Project. They will *Discover* an issue they care about, seeking out information to better understand that issue. They will *Connect* with others in their communities to find resources to utilize. They will create a plan and *Take Action* to create lasting change. Discover, Connect and Take Action-The Three Keys to Leadership.

How do I know if I have finished my Journey requirement?

Each girl must complete all of the awards in their Journey to complete that Journey. An adult volunteer or parent may act as to ourney Advisor and guide the girl through the Journey, signing off on her Silver or Gold report.

Is the GS Bronze Award required if I want to earn the GS Silver Award? Can I earn the GS Gold Award if I didn't earn a GS Silver Award?

Sirls who did not earn the Bronze Award can go on to earn the Silver Award. Girls who did not earn the Silver Award can go on to earn the Gold Award. Girls who earn the Silver do have the added advantage of dropping one of the required Journeys fo he Gold Award.

Is it true that girls are ineligible to earn highest awards if they haven't participated in the Council product sales?
False! While the council would like to see all girls take advantage of the product sales program, lack of participation will not be girls from earning their GS Bronze, Silver or Gold Awards. However- Girls are required to participate in both product sales programs to be eligible for any additional fund raising- money-earning or (to solicit for monetary contributions- Gold Award candidat mly). For the Silver Award, only the girls who are eligible may apply for money-earning approval and count that activity oward the award. For the Gold Award, the individual girl must participate in both product sales for money-earning/raising contributions eligibility. Troops pursuing the Bronze Award would need to participate in both products sales (individual girl participation is not a factor) and utilize the troop application. What highest awards support does GSNNJ offer?

nformational workshops are offered for all three awards. Highly recommended Bronze and Silver Award Workshops are offered to any adult who would like to learn more about the award and strategies for advising the girls. The Silver Quest program is available to help Silver Award candidates take the lead as they Take Action. The Gold Award Workshops (Go Gold 1- The Introduction/ Go Gold 2- The Project) are mandatory for any girl who would like to propose a Gold Award project. The workshops are highly recommended for any parent or advisor. Go Gold 2- The Project must be attended within a year of proposing the Gold Award Project.
